

## ***Instruction to authors submitting full paper to CARRS symposium***

Contributions of a full-paper to The First International Symposium on Cloud-prone and Rainy Area Remote Sensing (CARRS) should be prepared in format as outlined below. An example of a paper is attached to this file for reference purpose.

### **Format Requirements:**

**(1) Typing:** Manuscripts must be single-spaced on one side of 8½- by 11-inch or A4 International (210- by 297-mm) white paper, with 30-mm (1¼-inch) margins all around. The fonts should be Times New Roman (12 points).

**(2) Title of the Paper and Author Contact Information:** Title and headings must follow the sample paper as attached to this file. Contact information should include Name of author(s), affiliation, correspondence address, E-mail address.

**(3) Number of Copy and File format:** One digital copy of each complete manuscript is required to submit. The copy should include all text, illustrations, and tables. The file should be in MS WORD format.

**(4) Figures and Tables:** All figures and tables must be cited in the text. Figures and tables should be embedded in the text at the appropriate places with captions. If the manuscript contains copyrighted imagery, a copyright statement must be included in the caption (e.g. ©SPOT Image).

**(5) Paper Length:** The length of the paper is limited to 15 pages (including tables and figures). There will be no page charge for papers published in conference proceedings.

**(6) Abstract:** All manuscripts submitted must include an abstract of 250 words or less. The abstract should be stand-alone, complete, concise, informative and succinct.

**(6) Illustrations:** Authors should use black and white illustrations whenever possible. Color illustrations may be printed in Proceedings as black and white.

**(7) Metric System:** The metric system (SI Units) should be employed throughout a manuscript.

**(8) References:** A complete and accurate reference to works cited in the text should be included. Cite references to published literature in the text by authors' last names and date, as for example, Jones (1979), Jones and Smith (1979) or (Jones, 1979; Jones and Smith 1979), depending on sentence construction. If there are more than two authors, they should be cited as Jones *et al.* (1979) or (Jones *et al.*, 1979). Format for references in the reference list will be as follows:
